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

In a significant victory for healthcare providers across California, Proposition 35 was voted into law, establishing new requirements for how the state must allocate Managed Care Organization (MCO) tax revenues. The new law requires the state to direct MCO tax funds primarily toward increasing Medi-Cal payments for doctors, hospitals, and other healthcare providers. Previously, these funds were often diverted to help balance the state's general budget, despite their original intended purpose of supporting Medi-Cal providers. We are excited to see this new, guaranteed funding stream that should improve access to care for millions of low-income Californians who rely on Medi-Cal for their healthcare needs.

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
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rogressing Kaweah Health's vision to be world-class, orthopedic spinal surgeon Mathias Daniels, MD is making sure he has the best technology to make spinal surgery more accurate and safer for both his patients and his team. Recently, the hospital purchased an ExcelsiusGPS system that helps him navigate around a patient's spine and place screws without having to make a large incision.

Dr. Daniels often performs spinal fusion, a surgery that permanently joins together two or more bones in the spine so there is no movement between them. These bones are called vertebrae. The goal is to stop painful motion or to strengthen the spine.

This equipment, produced by Globus Medical, will reduce the length of a spinal surgery, and also limit radiation exposure for the patient and the

medical team. All CT scans take place prior to the surgery and are uploaded to the ExcelsiusGPS, which then uses that information to show Dr. Daniels exactly where he needs to place any screws, much like GPS maps with satellite view can direct drivers where they are going more clearly than a paper map.

Previously, Dr. Daniels would do multiple CT scans and X-rays on a patient,



some during the surgery, ensuring he had the best view. The ExcelsiusGPS allows Dr. Daniels to use that one scan, using a touchscreen on the machine to position the robotic arm to the exact location he desires.

"Through the use of navigation and robotic assistance I am able to place all hardware with as few as two preliminary X-rays, all to within less than a millimeter of accuracy. This level of accuracy dramatically surpasses the finest X-ray machines by a long shot," Dr. Daniels says. "There is less trauma to the patient and much less radiation exposure for (the medical staff). This is huge for our safety as well as our efficiency."

A fully open surgery without the aid of ExcelsiusGPS can take about 3 hours. however Dr. Daniels expects with this new technology it might only take 1 ½ hours. Much of the time spent in a spinal fusion is making sure the doctor has the correct location for the screws that help bind the vertebrae together. This machine does not replace his expertise, however the technology is like another pair of eyes in the room.

"It is almost like having a second surgeon in the room," he says. "It gives me more bandwidth to think about other elements of the surgery."

By only making small incisions for the screws, instead of a large incision, it is also possible for the patient to recover from the surgery with less pain and faster mobility, Dr. Daniels says. This technology could make it possible to find the correct placement on older bones, which have more wear and tear, and can prove trickier for doctors to stabilize.

"The ExcelsiusGPS system helps us take better care of our patients," says Kevin Bartel director of surgical service lines at Kaweah Health. "We want to use new technology to give the best care possible and help patients get well faster."

The ExcelsiusGPS has been in use for several years, giving Dr. Daniels knowledge from colleagues that it is a vetted system.

"I don't want to be first, but I also don't want to be the last one to take advantage of something that will become the industry standard," Dr. Daniels says.

Making spinal surgery more accurate and safer for both his patients and his team, Dr. Daniels is ultimately advancing Kaweah Health's commitment to innovative, patient-centered orthopedic care.





elodie Furtado did everything she could to avoid having spinal surgery again. The pain and slow recovery time of her first surgery 10 years ago was something she didn't want to repeat, no matter how much she ached.

In her mind she had gone to the best at a hospital in southern California and she just didn't ever feel great. Melodie, of Tulare, suffers from arthritis, an inflammation and stiffness in her joints. She had a spinal fusion, a surgery that permanently joins together two or more bones in the spine, called vertebrae, so there is no movement between them. The goal is to stop painful motion and strengthen the spine.

After managing the return of aches and pains with cortisone injections and everything but surgery, her left leg just ached and ached. Not only were everyday things harder, she wasn't able to play with her 19 grandchildren and her quality of life wasn't where she wanted it.

"The only way I can describe (my leg) is it hurt all the way to the bone," Melodie says.

Instead of going back to Irvine, this time Melodie started seeing orthopedic surgeon Mathias Daniels, M.D. at Kaweah Health. He is board-certified and spine fellowship-trained, specializing in spine and orthopedic surgery.

"I liked that Dr. Daniels was proactive, but did not jump to having surgery," she says. "He is very well mannered and he cares about his patients."

Dr. Daniels did what he could until surgery was the only option to stop her pain.

"I was prepared to be in the hospital for days like last time," Melodie says. "I had the surgery and I was up and walking the same day."

Melodie had her surgery on a Tuesday, went home from Kaweah Health on Wednesday, and was back to working from home by Monday. Recovery from her first surgery required a lot of pain medication and a walker, but she didn't need either this time.

"That was huge," she says. "It makes you stop and think 'why do we think we have to go away to find the best care?""

It isn't just Dr. Daniels and his work that has her grateful for Kaweah Health's world-class care. Two years ago her husband was saved here after suffering a major heart attack. She and her son performed CPR before the emergency medical personnel arrived and he was rushed to the hospital.

"Thank God for the nurses who were working that night," Melodie says. "The doctor saved his life and the nurses and staff gave him great care."

Now she and her husband are back to attending their grandchildren's baseball games and playing with them as much as possible. And in the near future, Melodie is on her way to doing something else she never thought she would do — having much needed neck surgery.

"I know I have arthritis everywhere, but I don't want to not be able to do anything," she says. "I'm very hopeful. I trust Dr. Daniels."

## **Every Second Counts**

Kaweah Health's Rapid Response Team saves lives

n moments of life-threatening emergencies, a specialized team at Kaweah Health can be seen racing through the hospital to help. Kaweah Health's Rapid Response Team is trained to respond to code blue situations — medical crises where every second is critical for saving lives.

This team of specially trained nurses is ready to go anywhere in the hospital. In the last two years, they have responded to 268 code blue calls, most involving cardiac arrest. Cardiac arrest occurs when the heart suddenly stops beating which can be due to disease processes such as an electrical malfunction or a heart attack, which is caused by blocked blood flow to the heart.

Recently, the Rapid Response Team received the prestigious Gold Award

from the American Heart Association, a recognition given for meeting high standards in resuscitation care under the Get with the Guidelines program. To earn this award, a team must meet all benchmarks for resuscitation at or above 85 percent for at least two consecutive years.

This is the first time Kaweah Health's Rapid Response Team has received this award, showcasing their hard work and commitment to excellence in emergency care.

"When we respond to an emergency, we don't need to talk; we instinctively know what each of us will do," says Jennifer Islas, RN, a member of the Rapid Response Team.

This teamwork extends beyond the Rapid Response Team itself.

"Rapid response brings everyone together," says Allyson Onstott, RN, a Rapid Response Team

member. "All departments come together, creating a sense of camaraderie. Staff recognize us, trust us, and that trust is invaluable."

Kaweah Health is one of only nine hospitals in California to receive the American Heart Association's Get with The Guidelines Resuscitation Gold Award. There are 10 team members who serve on the Rapid Response Team: Mayra Abundis Tejeda, RN, Elizebeth Dutra, RN, Danielle Essex-Torres, RN, Jennifer Islas, RN, Mayra Martinez, RN, Nancy Murphy, RN, Allyson Onstott, RN, Kayla Ourique, RN, Leonel Donate Perez, RN, and Remington Pipkin, RN.

A key to the team's success is the vigilance of nursing staff who recognize warning signs and call a code blue when necessary. Early recognition allows the Rapid Response Team to arrive even faster.


"We actively educate other nurses on how to recognize and respond to emergencies. It's rewarding to see all floors working together," says Danielle Essex-Torres, RN, another team member.

Shannon Cauthen, the Director of Cardiovascular and Critical Care Services. expressed pride in the team for achieving this national recognition.

"Their commitment to performing CPR correctly gives patients a better chance at survival and recovery," Cauthen says. "It's all about giving each person the best possible chance." 🖼

### There are four measures the team must meet:

- Making sure breathing tubes are correctly placed when patients can't breathe well.
- How quickly a defibrillator is used to restart a stopped heart.
- How guickly the heart medicine epinephrine is given during a heart emergency.
- Tracking how many cardiac events are detected by monitoring systems, helping the team react quickly.



or Dana Gomez, a Visalia native and longtime baseball coach, June 7, 2024, started like any other day at work. As a night shift employee, he was used to long hours and fatigue, but that morning felt different.

"I felt unusually winded, but I brushed it off," he recalls.

Later, without warning, Dana collapsed—his heart stopped for 10 minutes.

At home in Tulare, his wife Tammy received an urgent call about an accident

at his workplace. Unaware of the seriousness, she rushed to the local hospital. By the time she arrived, paramedics had successfully restarted Dana's heart, but he was in critical condition. He was quickly transferred to Kaweah Health Medical Center, where a team of cardiac specialists worked to stabilize him, eventually implanting a defibrillator and pacemaker to regulate his heart.

Dana has little memory of those critical first days, but Tammy remembers every moment vividly.



"It was terrifying, but the care team was incredible. They walked us through everything," she says.

Family gathered at the hospital, uncertain of the outcome. Dana, still unconscious, was receiving around-the-clock care as his medical team monitored him closely.

When Dana regained consciousness, he found himself surrounded by family.

"I didn't remember collapsing or what had happened," he says. "But I remember waking up, hearing my wife call my name, and feeling grateful to be alive."

He soon learned about the severity of his condition and the life-saving measures taken to keep him alive.

After being discharged from the hospital, Dana began his recovery with Kaweah Health's in-home physical therapy. Twice a week, rehabilitation specialists guided him through exercises to help him regain strength and confidence.

"At first, it was just small stuff—walking, basic exercises—but it made a big difference," Dana says.

This steady progress motivated him to keep pushing forward. Eventually, Dana transitioned to Kaweah Health's Cardiac Rehabilitation Program three times a week at Kaweah Health Rehabilitation Hospital for more-intensive therapy.

"I knew it was going to be challenging," he admits. "It was tough, but I knew it was helping."

Each session brought him closer to regaining his physical strength.

A graduate of Redwood High School, Dana was a pitcher for College of the Sequoias before being drafted by the Boston Red Sox in 1986. Today, he continues to enjoy life—coaching baseball, spending time with loved ones, and appreciating the small moments.

"It makes you appreciate the little things," he reflects. "Just being able to walk outside, feel the wind, and see the trees. I'm just thankful to be here."

Dana's journey serves as a reminder that cardiac events can happen unexpectedly, but with determination and the right care, recovery is possible. Surviving cardiac arrest taught him to embrace life with a renewed sense of gratitude.

#### What is Cleveland Clinic?



- Developed and refined multiple interventional cardiology procedures
- Played a crucial role in the early development and refinement of coronary angioplasty techniques
- Contributed to improving balloon angioplasty procedures, making them safer and more effective
- Pioneered the evolution of coronary stents, including the development and testing of drug-eluting stents
- Improved cardiac imaging and diagnostic tools such as intravascular ultrasound (IVUS) and optical coherence tomography (OCT).
- Led the development of transcatheter aortic valve replacement (TAVR) techniques



fter playing professional basket-ball, coaching, and making it into five hall of fames, going to the gym is more than a habit. At 95, Gene Smith is a testament to the power of staying active, engaged, and connected. A member of Kaweah Health Lifestyle Fitness Center for 27 years, Gene is a well-known figure at the gym, where he and his wife, Bess, work out five times a week.

"Lifestyle has been our home away from home," Gene says. "Our daughter Paula and her husband, Chris, are also members, so we enjoy having a daily, mini family reunion here."

Gene's love for sports has shaped his life. both on and off the court. A former professional basketball player with the Los Angeles Lakers, formerly the Minneapolis Lakers, Gene's journey has taken him from the National Basketball Association to Visalia, where he is a local legend. He became a varsity basketball coach at Redwood High School and served as a sports official in the Kings-Tulare area for 35 years. His dedication earned him five hall of fame inductions, including the Kings-Tulare Counties Sports Officials Association Hall of Fame (1994) and the South Dakota Sports Hall of Fame (2003).

For Gene, staying active is a lifelong commitment. He credits his dedication to fitness for keeping him strong and healthy well into his senior years. But the social aspect of his routine is just as important.

"Every day, I meet someone new or learn something about someone I didn't know before. It's inspiring to see young people working out, and I hope they stay with it into their senior years, as I have," he reflects.

As Gene looks back on his life, he's filled with gratitude for the experiences and friendships that have shaped him. His advice? "Age only defines you if you let it. Every day is a new opportunity to get better."

At 95, Gene is still in the game, showing what it means to live a life well-played.

## **Tiny Feet, Big Steps**

New Foundation campaign aims to improve pediatric and surgical care

his fall, the Kaweah Health Foundation kicked off its latest capital campaign, Tiny Feet, Big Steps, with the goal of helping both our youngest patients and older patients having short-stay surgeries.

The campaign will raise funds for renovating the Pediatric Unit and expanding the 3E Surgical Recovery Unit for short-term stays within the medical center. Both areas have seen significant advancement in care in the last 20 years and the rooms need a refresh.

"With this campaign, we will remodel each unit, creating more comfortable surroundings for patients," says Foundation Director Liz Wynn. "The pediatric area remodel will allow the children and their families to be more comfortable. Staying close to home is easier for families, and our youngest patients always feel better and more secure when family is nearby."

The campaign will also cover a remodel of the pediatric play area, which gives almost-recovered children a place to burn off excess energy while enticing older kids to leave their rooms and move around more, which is important to their recovery. The project will also include updated nurses' stations, an exam room, and a nutrition room.

Surgical recovery is an area that has seen large growth in patient volumes, thanks to an aging population that desires better mobility. The plan is to expand the area so patients with less-complex surgeries can be treated more efficiently.

"When you're in pain, you want treatment fast," Wynn says, noting that this addition will also mean more patients can get care. The campaign aims to raise \$3 million over a three-year period. Our own Kaweah Health employees are expected to donate about half of the money during the campaign. Nearly half of all Kaweah Health employees participate in the Employee Giving program, which sees employees donate a portion of each paycheck to the Foundation. The Foundation is offering community members or organizations room and unit naming opportunities in both units for larger donations. This practice area will allow patients to safely develop the skills needed to navigate hazardous terrains while walking or using a wheelchair, all under the expert guidance of Kaweah Health's skilled medical professionals. A ribbon cutting was held for the space, funded by Maison Law Accident & Injury Lawyers, in September.
